- 1. The Duration of the Post Graduate Diploma Course in Manuscriptology shall be one academic year of two terms of fourteen weeks each.
- 2. The teaching for the Post Graduate Diploma Course shall be four hours per week
- 3. A student who has qualified the Certificate Course in Manuscriptology of Pune University is eligible for admission to this course.
- 4. The Post Graduate Diploma Course Examination shall be held once a year at the end of the second term
- 5. The examination for the post Graduate Diploma Course shall consist of 4 papers of hundred marks. The Paper I, II & III shall be of three hours duration carrying hundred marks each. Paper IV shall consist of a dissertation of 50 pages (approx) of 75 marks + Computer Application to Manuscript Editing of 25 marks.
- 6. To pass the post Graduate Diploma Course examination, a candidate must obtain 40% of the total marks in each head of passing and 50% of the total marks in aggregate and shall be placed in Second Class. Those of the successful candidates who obtain 60% of the total marks shall be placed in First Class.

- 7. Classes for the course shall be held at the Centre of Advanced Study in Sanskrit, University of Pune, Ganeshkhind, Pune 411 007
- 8. Fees for the Post Graduate Diploma Course shall be as per University Rules
