# General Instructions about the Course, the Pattern of Examination and the Syllabus I. General Instructions

**I.1 General Structure:** Advanced Diploma Course in Buddhist Studies is a one-year course of semester pattern. It consists of two semesters and four papers of 50 marks each.

# I.2 Eligibility:

- Passed Advanced Certificate Course in Buddhist Studies or equivalent course in Buddhist Studies
- Passed H.S.C. or any other equivalent examination with Sanskrit / Pali / Chinese / Tibetan as one subject

# I.3 Duration: One academic year

**I.4 Fees:** The Admission Fee for the course, the Tuition Fee for the entire course of one-year duration, Examination Fee, Record Fee, Statement of Marks will be as per the rules and regulations of the Savitribai Phule Pune University.

# I.5 Teaching:

- Medium of instruction: English or Marathi
- Lectures: Six lectures per week for fifteen weeks.

## **II Pattern of Examination**

# **II.1 Assessment and Evaluation:**

- Advanced Diploma Course examination will be held at the end of each semester of the academic year.
- The examination for the Advanced Diploma Course will consist of an external written examination carrying 40 marks of two hours duration and an internal examination of 10 marks for all the four papers.

# **II.2 Passing:**

- To pass the Advanced Diploma Course examination a candidate must obtain either 40% of the total marks in each of the external and internal examination (i.e., separate passing: 16 in external and 4 in internal) or minimum 50% marks out of 50 (i.e., aggregate passing)
- Those of the successful candidates who obtain minimum 50% of the total marks will be placed in the second class and those obtaining minimum 60% of the total marks will be placed in first class.

# **II.2 Question Pattern:**

#### Semester I

# General Papers I and II: Total 50 marks each:

- External written examination (40 marks): Long answer (24 marks), short answer (10 marks), and short note (6 marks)
- Internal examination (10 marks): Oral, essay writing, group discussion, etc.

# **Special Papers I and II:** Total 50 marks each:

- External written examination (40 marks): Translation (6 marks), reference to context (4 marks), long answer (6 marks), and short answer (4 marks), unseen translation (Pali/Sanskrit to English or English to Marathi and vice-versa (5 marks), long answer (5 marks), explanatory notes (4 marks), applied grammar and composition (6 marks)
- Internal examination (10 marks): Recitation, reading skill, comprehension, and oral, etc.

Buddhism as religion and philosophy; nature of religion and place of dogmas in Buddhism; Centrality of ethics in Buddhism; Implications of Buddhist ethics to caste and gender; Buddhist doctrines of karma and rebirth; Buddhist approach to metaphysical ideas such as ātman and brahman; avyākṛtapraśnas and the Buddha's silence
