

Hunger Games: Yielding No Effect

Despite State Co-operative Society Workers' hunger strike reaching its 105th Day, there are no takers to resolve the issue. Although not paid for past 17 months; the resolve of the protesters continues to be resilient in a peaceful manner outside Central Building near Collector's Office.

Nine workers who were on hunger strike have been admitted to the hospital but it has not moved a single official in the hierarchy. The State Government Official has promised to look into the issue a few times but to no avail. The biggest irony of the strike is



the absence of the Society President, Mr. Jagannath Jadhav and other appointed officials. An anguished protester claimed that their President and other Committee officials are enjoying their AC offices while they are on the road under the sweltering heatdemanding a pay upgradation as per State Pay Commission.

This Society was formed by the Government specially to impart education

and training to Co-operative Institutes. For the past 100 years, the society workers have worked tirelessly to impart quality education and training. However, financial aid given by the State Governmentstopped suddenly in 1998 which aggravated when the StateEducation Grant was also terminated in 2013 leaving the Society high and dry. The society managed to function for sometime under grave constraints and eventually led to the small scale protest in 2015. This crisis has affected over 265 families of the workers who have not been paid for last 17

TIME TO BE VOCAL ABOUT OWN INTERESTS

Post 1998 Pokharan nuclear tests. USA and many countries except France imposed sanctions on India. Since then, a lot of water has flown under the bridgeand the relations with USA have certainly improved. However, it hasn't always been a smooth sailing. Presently, the two issues affecting the relationship are: India's decision to continue import of Iranian Oil and the Russian S - 400 Air Defence deal.

Energy security has always been a sensitive and challenging issue to all 'non or less oil producing' economies like India which satisfies almost 80 % of its crude oil requirement through imports. Since pulling out of nuclear deal with Iran in May this year, USA has been openly cautioning countries to stop importing oil from Iran. Incidentally, Iran is India's third largest supplier of crude oil and Indian economy

needs assured crude oil supply to sustain healthy growth of economy.

China and Pakistan have emerged as 'All Weather' allies over last few decades. The collusive threat with depleted numbers of Indian Air Force (IAF) squadrons necessitated Russian S - 400 deal. As

S - 400 Air Defence System is the best in the world with unmatched ranges, it gives IAF a significant edge during war. Both decisions have been driven by the national interest and the same needs to be conveyed to all our allies especially USA from our perspective.

There are no permanent friends or enemies but only 'Permanent Interests'. This can be easily judged from the fact that the US started looking at India as a reliable partner and a possible ally in South Asia only when the Chinese juggernaut challenged the US dominated unipolar world. India should fully utilise the current US relationship while securing her own energy and national security needs. This can be achieved through meaningful, firm and multilevel diplomacy. The first 2+2 dialogue held last month with the United States of America is the ideal beginning for deeper engagement to ensure preservation of 'Energy and National Security'.

National interests remain supreme and should never be diluted under any circumstances. As 'Interests' are perpetually dynamic; India should continue to engage USA at various levels. Simultaneously, we should pursue past successful approach of maintaining friendly relations with other dominant powers and not remaining in a single camp. The tilt in any camp can hurt out interests in the future especially during challenging times. I feel that it is the appropriate time for India to stand up and be vocal about pursuing and preserving own interests as there are no permanent allies. but only permanent interests.

Amristar Tragedy: A Case of Negligence

On Friday night, an ordinary night of fireworks and burning effigies in Amritsar was transformed into a horrifying nightmare when a train ran over the passers-by standing on the tracks leaving behind atrail of nearly 150 injured and almost 62 dead. Soon accusations began flying and the burning question was- whose fault was it in the end?

On hearing about the tragedy, the Indian Railways issued a statement that they were not informed prior about the event and therefore were

unaware of the gathering of 300 people on the tracks. The organisers hit backclaiming that the train was speeding and thus, plowed through the crowd. Eyewitnesses have also accused the train driver of lying that he was pelted with stones as the whole tragedy happened in a matter of seconds and caught everyone unaware.

So, the negligence was on whose part? If the organisers have been arranging such events year after year, why weren't any precautions taken? There was a clear absence of barricades and police personnel around to keep a check on the crowd. Even if they were technically 'trespassers' on the tracks, a properly designed warning system could have dispersed the mass gathering and the tragedy could have been avoided. Last but not the least, it was certainly unwise to have the burning of the Ravan effigy so close to the tracks (not even abandoned) in the first place!

It all eventually boils down to poor organisation skills and serious lack of implementation of safety and security measures by the event managers and railways alike which if followed, would not have left a wake of destruction and deeply tragic loss of lives.



The magnificent archway commemorating the landing of King George V when he visited India in 1911, is located right on the waterfront and is always packed with people. Food:

Vada Pav. Vada Pav a must-have, originated first as cheap street food in Mumbai, but is now served in food stalls and restau-



rants across the country. Vada Pav consists of a deep fried potato dumpling placed inside a bread bun (pav) sliced in half through the middle. It is generally accompanied with chutneys and green chilli peppers.

How to get to Mumbai from Pune?

Taking train is the most convenient and cheapest way to travel to Mumbai City for a day trip. After paying INR104 for a seat at general compartment and spending around 4 hours on the train, you will reach to Chhatrapati Shivaji Terminus Railway Station. Chai plays an important role in every Indian's daily life. The hot drink keeps the vendors warm who often start their day at crack of dawn. At lunch time, it is easy to catch groups of white collars gathering around chaiwallahs, chatting and enjoying the favorite beverage. After a long day of studying, a cup of chai is again an indispensable ingredient of the vibrant conversations among youngsters. Although chai appears frequently in our lives; how many people actually know about the history of this 'national' drink?

Tea first appeared in ancient India as a form of herbal medicine rather than a drink. It gained universal attention in the 1830s when the British East India Company raised concerns about the Chinese monopoly on tea. The British colonists noticed the existence of tea plants in Assam and began to cultivate tea plantations locally.

Despite the increasing export to other countries; the consumption of black

tea in India remained low until a promotional campaign by the Indian Tea Association in early 20th century. This British-owned organization encouraged factories, mines, and textile mills to provide tea breaks for their workers and also supported the business of chaiwallahs across the railway system.

Regarding the addition of milk to tea, it is believed that the first form of chai with milk was developed by travelers and traders mostly from Gujarat, Maharashtra and Bengal. They were people who came from regions with good quality milk and with the growing cross-country trade; sweet milky chai became the go-to drink. Later, the masala chai (chai flavored with aromatic spices) arrived and is usually served with sweet and savory toasts- a blend of Indian and British tradition

Book Review - Paradise 'Lost' Towers.

Having heard that Shwetha Bachchan-Nanda would be the latest to join the bandwagon of celebrity writers with her debut 'Paradise Towers' a drama infused with mystery; I was somewhat intrigued and wondered if she had anything new to bring to the table. Needless to say, I was sorely disappointed.

The novel begins, continues and finishes with endlessly dull narrations about the residents living in the seemingly idyllic apartment complex whose description itself takes around three-four pages. Nanda takes her time establishing her many characters who, while inclusive and from all backgrounds; are burdened with their stereotypes and clichés which makes them redundant and



fail to evoke any sense of true sympathy in the reader.

The plot seems to thicken when Mrs. Mody, a septuagenarian inhabitant is found dead in her apartment. Quite naturally, it creates a stir among the others and a mystery begins to develop. However, before you can even the process the mystery fully, it is resolved in the next couple of pages which makes you wonder what the true plot of the book is.

Nanda seems to have the same question in mind as she dabbles with not one but two sub-plots!One of them is an inter-caste marriage which unfolds during a Diwali celebration in an extremely predictable manner and without any bang. The other sub-plot is admittedly more interesting but happens towards the climax and is tied up rather hurriedly thus leaving you with a sense of unsatisfaction.

The only redeeming feature of the novel is Nanda's wry sense of humourwhere she points out the simple ironies of life at which you can't help but chuckle. If only there were more of those than the exhausting expositions!

So if you're looking for a good juicy mystery and intrigue; this is not the book for you. However, if you want a quick bite-sized read to go with your evening chai, go right ahead!
