Pune Public Health Research Conference 2011

Public health is a discipline of contrasts. On the one hand, it is a very people-centric discipline where research findings reach the public domain as soon as the research is published. In the public arena, the research is translated into a consumer-oriented list of prescriptions for healthy living. Somewhere along the process, the difficult interdisciplinary research work that goes into making salient observations looses visibility. The investigators struggle with the research design, statistical calculations, ethical clearance, interpretation of interdisciplinary data, the challenge and uncertainties of statistical observations, not to mention the brutal peer review remains out of sight of the public who use this information for healthy living.

The other intended user of public health research is also sometimes overlooked. The primary goal of public health research is to provide data to government health services. These form the key agency in the country that has the role of preventing disease and promoting good health. These activities are based on evidences emanating from research findings. As public health research throws up newer health challenges for a population in epidemiological transition, the role of the health system becomes extremely challenging in the face of existing conditions and emerging situations.

With this background, the Pune Public Health Research Conference aims at bringing together public health researchers from this city to understand different facets of public health with evidence based data. We would expect to understand the global and national status, the contribution of the author's research in this field, the methodological competencies and the route for translation of this knowledge for intervention. In this conference, we will emphasize the role of evidence in guiding intervention strategies, health systems prescriptions and future areas of research investigation.
